

His belief is that every family deserves a fighting chance, and he endeavors to be a role model to help cancer patients and their families. As he says on his website, "Stay strong and have faith."

On June 10, Barrington residents Alisa and Rick Heidner and their family hosted an extraordinary event to bring together Rizzo, two other baseball legends, and Chicago Cubs director Todd Ricketts, as well as their guests in support the Foundation. The late spring weather held up beautifully for the fundraiser that was held outdoors. Guests mingled between the cocktail hour and hors d'oeuvres in anticipation of seeing some of Chicago baseball's heavy hitters—Anthony Rizzo, Frank Thomas, Ryne Sandberg, and Cubs' Board Director Todd Ricketts—to arrive.







