The Veterans of LBS is a chartered club authorized by the Lake Barrington Community Home Owners Association. Members reside within Lake Barrington Shores and support the purpose of the organization—to foster patriotism and an appreciation and recognition of our veterans—through a variety of events, like this one that featured BraveHearts for one of the club's Military Speaker's Bureaus. The club is also active within the community in our schools, with Toys for Tots, and many other services.

Since 2002, BraveHearts has been serving men and women of the armed forces, as well as saving lives, through equine-assisted activities and therapies with their team of expert staff, dedicated volunteers, and excellent therapy horses. BraveHearts also helps children and adults with special needs in their safe facilities and through a caring, expert staff. BraveHearts utilizes innovative services with the help of a faculty of national experts for its programming, education, training, and research, bringing hope, joy, and a renewed life of possibilities through the healing power of the horse.

The afternoon event included opening remarks by Tom Gilder, president of the Veterans of LBS. Guests and attendees recited the Pledge of Allegiance. There were recognition awards and remarks from BraveHearts personnel. A drill team performance by BraveHearts was offered by its allmilitary veteran riding team. Other fun events included hug-a-donkey, roping lessons, and a chance to interact with one of BraveHeart's mustangs in the round pen. There, guests learned about the gentle way to lead and communicate with a wild mustang, one that was adopted and is now part of the BraveHearts program.
