## Meeting of the Minds

BARRINGTON'S CULTURAL COMMISSION HOSTS THIRD ANNUAL TOWN-WARMING EVENT FEATURING GOV. CHRIS CHRISTIE

n a snowy winter day in January, the Village of Barrington's Cultural Commission re-created a 1940s-era Barrington tradition called the "Town-Warming". On Saturday, January 25, 2020, more than 180 people gathered at Barrington's White House to immerse themselves in a day-long speaker series that was keynoted by Gov. Chris Christie, who participated in a fireside chat with his good friend and Town-Warming sponsor Greg Brown, Chairman and CEO of Motorola Solutions. Presenting sponsor of the event was Northern Trust.

Titled "Vision 2020 Part II: Media, Politics, and the Arts in the New Decade," this third annual Town-Warming featured more than a dozen speakers and panelists of local and national significance who spoke on important topics of the day.

The event kicked off with a welcome from Village of Barrington President Karen Darch, who has been the visionary behind the Town-Warming. She was followed by Rev. Dr. Zina Jacque, senior pastor of the Community Church of Barrington, who prepared the audience for the day with a courageous vision of coming together as a community and being open to a wide variety of thoughts and perspectives.

The first panel featured a discussion of the media in the modern era and was moderated by Corey McPherrin, anchor at WFLD FOX Chicago. The panel featured political editor Mike Flannery of WFLD; Daily Herald Editor and Senior Vice President John Lampinen; and former CBS and NBC news anchor Derrick Blakely. The panel discussed the state of media today and the challenges of fairness, truth, and accurate reporting in the hyper-partisan environment of an election year.

The second panel centered around the importance of the arts in our increasingly polarized and always-on culture. The panel included Lynn Osmond, President & CEO of the Chicago Architecture Center; Fawn Ring, Director of Lectures and Performance Programs at The Art Institute of Chicago; Crystal Coats, Director of Community Programs, Lyric Opera of Chicago; and Veronica Roth, a native Barringtonian and best-selling author of the Divergent Series. The panel discussed the importance of the arts in an increasingly fractured world, and the state of the arts in 2020.

Following a break for lunch, guests were entertained by WGN radio personality John Williams, who interviewed "Teddy Roosevelt" as performed by humanities scholar and character actor Clay Jenkinson. John and "Teddy" provided muchneeded perspective on the state of politics today through the lens of the politics of the early 1900s. The highlight of the day was the keynote presentation, a "fireside chat" between Motorola Chairman and CEO Greg Brown and Gov. Chris Christie. Gov. Christie regaled the audience with tales of his governorship in New Jersey, as well as the nuances of his relationship with President Donald Trump. No matter your politics, Gov. Christie provided a thoughtful and thought-provoking look at the current political landscape, as well as an unfiltered look into the mind of Donald Trump.
